# Covid-19 Pandemic and Economic and Social Rights

#### Global Classroom

#### Description

The Global Classroom, one of the flagship activities of the Global Campus, is designed to bring together students, professors and experts from our seven regions. It is a research programme focussed on a topic of current interest, different every year, whereby students from across the Global Campus network study, analyse and discuss the selected topic through the lenses of regional perspectives. The uniqueness of this annual event lies in the possibility to deepen the understanding of global human rights challenges and foster inter-regional academic exchange and collaboration. Students, alumni and research coordinators will convene in a four-day online event, including a high-level panel discussion that will be live-streamed and open to anyone.

The focus of this year's Global Classroom is on Covid-19 Pandemic and Economic and Social Rights. COVID-19 is a global public health emergency without parallel since 1918 and has affected not only the right to health but also a range of other socio-economic rights.

Millions of people are out of work, lack adequate social protection, and have been unable to pay for essential needs. Those who are marginalised and disadvantaged by income and non-income indicators, however, are exposed to even greater risks, experience more extreme forms of deprivation and discrimination, and are denied a range of socio-economic rights. The right to Education also has been severely compromised in different countries and regions. Schools have been closed and attempts have been made to provide children with on-line education. Here, too, existing inequalities have been exacerbated and the pre-existing limitations of educational systems have hit vulnerable children in developing countries who often have problems of internet access, lack computers and other necessary infrastructure, and teachers lacking preparation and capabilities of dealing with the situation. All these factors result in children in disadvantaged groups particularly being denied the right to education.

The research carried out by the seven Regional Research teams of the Global Classroom and the discussion with experts at the live event will provide analysis and critical reflection in response to the following questions: In which ways has the COVID-19 pandemic impacted economic and social rights of individuals and groups, including the dynamics and dialectics of these interactions and the role of social resilience in meeting these challenges? How have responses to COVID-19 revealed preexisting weaknesses in access to economic, cultural, and social rights by groups and communities that are relatively disadvantaged? How might long-term approaches for mitigating future human rights harms like those caused by COVID-19 be developed and implemented in future crises?
